



Sharing a Meal at the Club's Kids Café

In Massachusetts, childhood hunger remains at epidemic proportions: nearly one out of five children under twelve is hungry or at-risk of being hungry. Research has shown that there are crucial relationships between nutrition and health and further, between nutrition and learning. Even mild forms of hunger can cause adverse effects in children, including difficulties with learning and cognitive development, fatigue, and iron deficiency anemia.

Here at the West End House Boys & Girls Club, youth members enjoy a hot, nutritious meal each day through the *Kids Café* program. The mission of *Kids*

Café is to provide meals to disadvantaged youth in an environment that is safe, accessible, and convenient. Through a partnership with the Greater Boston Food Bank, the Club serves over 30,000 meals a year to youth members. The number of youth receiving meals at the WEHBGC has more than doubled since the inception of the *Kids Café* in 1999.

Kids Café offers kids a chance to slow down, sit at a table with staff, volunteers, and friends, share a meal, and have a conversation. They are re-fueling their bodies, but also learning life skills such as table manners, clean-up responsibilities, and communication.

In partnership with the Jackson Mann Community Center, programs in education, the arts, technology, and leadership are offered and are guided by the same principles that were present in Louis Kane's life: hard work, social responsibility, activism, and community involvement.

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Volunteerism on the Rise at the Club!

Awalk through the West End House Boys & Girls Club's education center at 4:00 PM reveals an interesting new phenomenon. As usual, youth members are sitting at tables with their homework out and staff are busy helping with math problems, phonics, or history homework. However, a new team of adult volunteers are also there. They have chosen to give their time and talents to Club members and their presence has provided much needed one-on-one support. These volunteers initially

Paris Burstyn, a business consultant, also spends time with young people reinforcing math and reading skills. The Club's education center usually sees between 75 and 100 youth each day and staff are thrilled with the level of support these volunteers provide.

New adult volunteers can be found throughout the Club. Cador Pricejones began volunteering at the Club almost seven years ago when he helped build the climbing wall and initiate the program. Rob Rhuda, board member of a local social service organization for adults with disabilities, volunteers with Cador each Thursday at the wall-climbing program. Long time volunteers like WEHBGC board member Joe Walsh continue to give endless hours to our

young people, while parents of our members help with swim meets, assist in serving dinner, and have volunteered to help in visual art classes.





Charles has served as chair of the development committee, playing an integral role in the revitalization of our fundraising efforts and most recently served as chair of the board development committee – two roles that have prepared him well for his term as President of the WEHBGC.

Inaugural Class of Brian J. Honan Fellows

In July 2002, the Allston-Brighton community lost one of its shining stars when City Councilor Brian Honan passed away unexpectedly at the age of thirty-nine. To honor him, the West End House Boys & Girls Club, together with Brian's family and friends, created The Brian J. Honan Fellowship. With initial support from Harvard University, club professionals and community partners have developed a program that seeks to inspire young people to serve their community.

The service learning fellowship will empower youth to develop leadership skills and stimulate an interest in public service. Participants will attend weekly group meetings to discuss issues of policy, access to services, and community challenges. They will identify neighborhood concerns and develop action plans to address them.

A mentoring component will ensure that students will have weekly one-on-one academic support. The year-long program will culminate with a summer internship in a community agency or

government office. As alumni, youth will continue to serve through active participation as the youth voice on committees and community boards.

The inaugural class of fellows will convene their first meeting in December and are planning their first project for this winter. This program will serve as a living tribute to a man who gave so much of himself to the community and the Club.

The Endowment Challenge

In April 2002, the West End House Boys & Girls Club re-opened its expanded and renovated Club on Allston Street. Improvements include:

- A state-of-the-art technology lab;
- new space for individual and small-group educational programs;
- the addition of a performing arts studio;
- expanded space for visual arts and photography;
- an area devoted exclusively to teen-oriented programs;
- a new commercial kitchen and a new dining space for members.

There is a contagious energy and spirit of rejuvenation in the new Clubhouse that is a part of every program and activity.

Supporters of the WEHBGC passionately believe that the work at the Club must continue and grow. The board of directors has developed a strategic plan that calls for program expansion and a strengthened endowment.

Last year, an anonymous foundation awarded the WEHBGC an endowment challenge grant of \$750,000. The grant requires a two to one match, challenging the WEHBGC board to

raise \$1.5 million by March 2004. When this goal is reached, the Club's endowment will have grown from its 1998 total of \$300,000 to \$2.5 million.

Thus far, supporters have rallied to fund 80% of the goal with a vision to continue the legacy of quality programs for youth. The endowment will provide a strong future and ensure that generations of children to come will have the opportunity to learn and grow at the WEHBGC.
